# **VARDHAMAN MAHAVEER OPEN UNIVERSITY: KOTA**

## **ANNUAL REPORT YEAR 2005-2006**

### **INTRODUCTION**

Vardhaman Mahaveer Open University (previously known as Kota Open University, renamed through a Gazette notification by the Government of Rajasthan on 21<sup>st</sup> September 2002) was established on July 23, 1987 as a part of the Open University network in the country. The New Education Policy adopted by the Parliament in 1986 recognized that the educational opportunities were both inadequate and unequal. It recognized the Open University system as a cost-effective alternative to the present conventional system of higher education. The State Government of Rajasthan took a decision by establishing conducive Vardhaman Mahaveer Open University for the objectives of the new Policy achieving.

In order to strengthen and achieve better coordination of the vast but scattered resources of distance education in the State, the Government of Rajasthan decided to transfer the Institute of Correspondence Studies, Jaipur and Udaipur to Vardhaman Mahaveer Open University along with all their assets. The decision was in strict conformity with the National Policy of abandoning correspondence studies by conventional universities where Open University System had already developed to discharge distance education functions.

### **OBJECTIVES AND FUNCTIONS**

The university is devoted to the noble cause of democratizing higher education and providing a new and parallel mode of education to those who wish to receive higher education with the following specific objectives:

- ? to advance and disseminate learning and knowledge by a diversity of means, including the use of latest communication technology;
- ? to provide educational opportunities to larger and larger segments of population, and particularly to the disadvantaged groups such as those living in remote and rural areas including working people, housewives and other adults who wish to upgrade or acquire knowledge through studies in various fields;
- ? to provide an innovative system of higher education which is flexible and open with regard to methods and pace of learning, combination of courses, eligibility for enrolment, age of entry, conduct of examination with a view to promote learning and encouraging excellence in all fields of knowledge;
- ? to improve the higher educational system in the State by providing a non-formal channel complementary to the formal system by making wide use of texts and other teaching softwares developed by the University;
- ? to develop innovative, need based vocational courses and establish Industry/institution links for developing the society; and

- ? to provide or arrange for training of staff required for open and distance education system.

The academic activities fall under the four Schools of Studies which are run by select academic ians from all over the country. The Vice-Chancellor, Pro Vice-Chancellor, Directors, Registrar, Controller of Examinations and Finance Officer are the main functionaries of the university.

Besides headquarters, VMOU has a network of six Regional Centres, spread all over the State and each Regional Centre has several Study Centres under its jurisdiction. It is these study centres, which function as the interface between the University and its students.

## RESOURCES OF THE UNIVERSITY

The resources of the University can be broadly categorized as physical, human and financial.

### **1. THE PHYSICAL RESOURCES**

#### **Campus:**

The University has two types of campuses:

- (a) Headquarter at Kota
- (b) Regional Centres at six different locations in the State.

(a) **Headquarters:** At headquarters University is situated in its own campus developed on a land of about 75 Acres. The following offices are at present functioning from the main campus:

(b) **Regional Centres:** There are six Regional Centres at present. We have our own buildings for Udaipur and Jaipur Regional Centres. The process for acquiring permanent buildings for rest of the Regional Centres is already in the pipeline. For Bikaner and Jodhpur Regional Centres two houses have been purchased from Rajasthan Housing Board. For Regional Centre of Ajmer the purchase is to be finalized shortly.

### **2. HUMAN RESOURCES**

Human Resources available at present with the Vardhaman Mahaveer Open University are divided into three categories

- A. Teaching staff
- B. Non-teaching staff
- C. Technical staff

## **A. TEACHING STAFF**

It is to be emphasized that the teachers in the open universities work under the service conditions laid down by the University Grants Commission but their teaching responsibilities are quite different in the open education system. The teachers of the open universities do not teach in the regular classroom like conventional universities. It is to be noted that for open universities a central body known as Distance Education Council (DEC) prescribes guidelines for various activities including teacher's workload.

As per the guidelines of DEC, the workload of teachers is defined as follows:

1. Professor: Development of a new academic programme equivalent to 8 credits\*, preparation of new home assignments every year, maintenance of existing programmes.
2. Associate Professor: Development of a new academic programme equivalent to 4 credits\*, preparation of new home assignments every year, maintenance of existing programmes.
3. Assistant Professor: Development of a new academic programme equivalent to 2 credits\*, preparation of new home assignments every year, maintenance of existing programmes.

(\*Credit means study hours. One credit is equal to 30 hours of study).

The Teaching manpower is further divided into two categories:

- (a) Faculty members at headquarters
- (b) Academic Staff managing Student Support Services throughout the state.

## **PART-TIME ACADEMIC STAFF**

The staff, both managerial and academic, working at the Study Centres comes under the category of part-time staff. The teachers imparting education through face-to-face interaction are called as Academic Counsellors. They are paid remuneration for each counselling session. There are two modes of counselling practiced at Study Centres:

- (a) Regular weekly Counselling

(b) Intensive Counselling

The total strength of Academic Counsellors working at present is 3500. They constantly increase with the increased number of students and number of academic programmes.

**B. NON-TEACHING STAFF**

The University has a strength of 321 non-teaching staff ranging from LDC to Dy. Registrar.

**C. TECHNICAL STAFF**

There is a need to create a third category of staff i.e. technical staff to make the Open University technologically meaningful and successful. University has a well developed Educational Media Production Centre (Studio) and Computer Centre. Given below is the chart showing the sanctioned strength but all post are lying vacant since.

Besides running these programmes successfully, the School is also looking after the computerization work pertaining to different units of the University. Right from the admission to the examination and declaration of results, the school is performing all the computer related data feeding and data processing work. In addition to this all the financial transactions of the University including budget preparation, salary processing etc. are done by the School.

The school is also looking after the Educational Media Production Unit of the University. On the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of every month, a radio counselling session on a predefined topic is conducted at Akashwani Bhawan, Jaipur. It provides live interaction between the learners and the counsellors.

## SOUTH ASIA FOUNDATION CELL



**South Asia Foundation (SAF)** is a voluntary, secular, non-profit and non-political youth movement. Founded by UNESCO Goodwill Ambassador Madanjeet Singh, its main objective is to promote regional cooperation and peace through education, mutual understanding and creative friendship among the young people of South Asia.

### Madanjeet Singh Scholarships

SAF is offering Madanjeet Singh Scholarships in higher education and vocational training for the marginalized, economically disadvantaged South Asian Students of India, Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Bhutan, Maldives, Nepal, Pakistan and Sri Lanka.

Students who wish to avail the scholarships are required to become members of SAF, which is free of cost. It enables the student to apply for a scholarship for vocational training, distance learning and friendship camps or to utilize the facilities of SAF Documentation and Information Centres provided that “they take the pledge to promote regional cooperation and peace”.

In India the fellowships will be distributed among State Open Universities. Accordingly the students registered with Vardhaman Mahaveer Open University for vocational and higher educational programmes will be eligible for the scholarship.

#### **1. Objective:**

SAF Madanjeet Singh Scholarships are being offered to promote regional cooperation and lifelong secular learning that emphasizes humanism and celebrates the rich heritage of South Asia’s unity in diversity at all levels and sections of the society.

#### **2. Eligibility:**

1. A student must be a SAF member.
2. Scholarships are available to Indian nationals permanently living in Rajasthan only and are registered with VMOU.
3. Young men and women who have been selected for admission to the programmes approved for scholarships offered by VMOU are eligible for the scholarship as per rules.

4. Students should not be over the age of 30 years on 31<sup>st</sup> July of the admission session.
5. Parental income including the income of the student, should not exceed Rs.120,000/- per annum.
6. Students should not be engaged in other Higher Educational Programmes in other universities/institutes.

### **3. Procedure for applying for Scholarship:**

Student must be registered in South Asia Foundation by applying online to SAF. A Registration Number will be allotted to the students after taking oath of developing mutual cooperation and integration in South Asian Countries. ### **RESEARCH CELL**

The University has been conducting Research Degree Programme for Ph. D since 1990. The Research Cell also administrates the research projects, fellowships and research grants sanctioned by various agencies to the faculty members and research students. During the year 2005-06 (1<sup>st</sup> April 2005 to 31 March 2006) 16 students were registered and 10 students have been awarded Ph.D. Degree.

The University is facilitating research degree in the faculties of Arts, Social Sciences, Education, Technical Education, Commerce, Management and Library Science, This is worth mentioning that alongwith discipline based research inter disciplinary research has been encouraged for the benefit of the society. Applied and action based research is also being promoted.

## CENTRAL LIBRARY

The University started its Central Library during the year 1987 – 88, but its actual functioning started in July 1988. The primary mission of the library is to support the educational and research programmes of the University by providing physical and intellectual access to information. In accordance with the objectives of the University, the library aims to develop a comprehensive collection of documents useful for the readers.

VMOU operates through a three- tier system having University headquarters at Kota, 6 Regional Centres at the divisional headquarters and 66 Study Centres scattered all over the state. Library is a hierarchical system with the central library at the headquarters followed by libraries located at the Regional Centres and Study Centres. The Central Library caters to the need of the headquarters- teaching and non – teaching staff, research scholars, special members, etc. The Libraries at RCs look into the library requirements of staff; students, counsellors and coordinators at Regional Centres and the libraries at SCs are meant exclusively to meet out the needs of the students.

The Central Library is the main library which co-ordinates the effective functioning and development of libraries at RCs and SCs.

The Central Library is working in a newly constructed beautiful round shaped building. The total built up area of the building is 2036.00 Sq. Mt. The libraries at RCs & SCs are housed in the premises allotted for the RCs & SCs purposes. Our new central library building has almost all-important sections of library such as: acquisition, stack, reference, periodical, rare book, technical, computer, audio-visual, circulation, etc. Most of the sections are well equipped with basic infrastructure.

The VMOU Library System is the most resourceful information centre in the field of Distance Education. One of its own kind the library has sizable collection of books, journals and other related materials in the field of Distance Education.

The Library systems has sizable collection of documents: such as 84358 books, 8354 reference books, 1885 bound volumes journals, 275 theses and dissertations 431 audio-visual cassettes 115 CDs of books, 303CDs and 17 DVDs of Journals. 1561 books, 171 Journals (155 national and 16 foreign journals) were in the collection during the financial year 2005-06 Out of 1561 books 397 books were sent to libraries at RCs & SCs. About 16 newspapers were also subscribed in the library. The library has spent rupees 12.92 lacs for the purchase of books and journals and other items.

## EXAMINATION WING

### **Progress Report: - (1st April 2005 to 31<sup>ST</sup> March 2006)**

The *examination & evaluation pattern of this university has two components: -*

1) Term End Examinations: It carries a weightage of 70% of the total marks, prescribed for each course. The term end examinations are held twice in a year in June & December.

2) Internal Assignments: It is an important component for continuous evaluation of the student at home. It carries 30% weightage. The Internal Assignments are sent to the students and they are required to answer the same at their home. Out of these three, two best are taken into account in the final result of the examination of the student. A five point grading system known as Letter Grade System is used in term end examination. Letter Grade System is used for grading continuous and term end examination components; which is as under: -

**A. Excellent    B. Very Good    C Good        D Satisfactory    E Unsatisfactory**

For successful completion, a student should obtain at least 'D' Grade both in term end examination and internal assignments separately.

The university conducted successfully two term end examinations of 40 Academic Programmes in June 2005 and 41 Programmes in December 2005 in which 7994 & 7300 students appeared and 3411 & 3672 students were declared pass respectively. (Programme wise details enclosed at annexure 'A' & 'B'). These examinations were conducted at 14 & 16 examination centres under the jurisdiction of 6 Regional Centres of this University scattered all over the State. Keeping in view the interest of the students, examinations were also conducted at Military Study Centre at Suratgarh & Itarana and Central Jail Kota. In addition to the term end examination, B.Ed. Entrance Test at 24 Centres and Management Entrance Test at 6 Centres were also successfully conducted and their results were also declared in time. For smooth conduct of these examinations exam forms filled in by the students were checked and Roll lists were prepared. Question papers of various Programmes were set, moderations were also done. The question papers were also sent to the centres in time as per requirement and used answer books were collected and evaluated. Results were declared in time and mark sheets were also sent to the students in time.

## **REGIONAL SERVICES**

### **INTRODUCTION**

The Vardhaman Mahaveer Open University came into being by an act enacted by Rajasthan State Legislature in the year 1987. It was established with the objective of incorporating and promoting the system of distance education in the educational pattern in the State of Rajasthan. The distinctive features of open learning system and distance education methodology are as follow :

### **REGIONAL SERVICES UNIT**

Regional Services Unit provides a statewide network of Academic Support Services for the students.

This is organized through 65 Study Centres and 6 Regional Centres established throughout the state. The Regional Services Unit has three-tier structure:

1. Directorate of Regional Services at the headquarters headed by Director (Regional Services).
2. Regional Centres in the specified regions headed by Director, Regional Centre.
3. Study Centres located all over Rajasthan generally in the Educational Institutions headed by Chief Coordinator.

### **(A) MAJOR FUNCTIONS OF REGIONAL SERVICES UNIT AT HEADQUARTER**

1. Planning for new Study Centres & Coordinating the activities of Existing Regional and Study Centres.
2. Monitoring the activities of Regional Centres and Study Centres.
3. Formulation of infrastructure requirement for various Academic programmes of VMOU at Regional Centres & Study Centres.
4. Working out norms for launching academic programmes.
5. Planning and executing staff development programmes for Regional and Study Centre functionaries.
6. Budgeting and accounting of expenditure of all Regional Centres and Study Centre in the country.
7. Appointment and orientation of Academic Counsellors.
8. Dealing with student grievances.
9. Providing information to prospective students.

### **(B) REGIONAL CENTRES**

At present Regional Centres are functioning at Ajmer, Bikaner, Jaipur, Jodhpur, Kota and Udaipur. The major functions of Regional Centres are:

## 1. Enquiry

To attend enquiries from prospective students, current students, past students, and general public about the role and nature of VMOU in the State of Rajasthan.

## 2. PROMOTIONAL ROLE

Regional centers are expected to perform a variety of activities to promote Open Learning System and Distance Education Methodology such as:

- a) Generating public awareness in the regions about VMOU.
- b) Promotion of good will among the academic and administrative staff of higher learning institutions in the region.
- c) Promotion of good will among the local Govt. authorities towards VMOU.
- d) Promotion of positive and helpful attitude towards VMOU students among the employers of different sections.
- e) Promotion of Open Education System through participation in Television and Radio programmes in regional and local seminars and by way of preparing and publishing promotional literature in the region.

## STUDY CENTRES

In the open University system, Student Support Services are built on the concept of a local center known as Study Centre. Study Centres are established to offer students academic facilities & communication link with the VMOU. The activities of Study Centres are basically meant to supplement the course contents covered in the printed material. Organizing audio-video sessions and face-to-face interaction with academic counsellors does it. The basic objective of operational facilities is to make a student independent learner and to develop a proper attitude in learner for learning with the help of latest communication technologies used in the field of education.

### *Types of Study Centres*

At present five types of Study Centres are operating in different part of the state.

- a. Regular Study Centre
- b. Specific programme Study Centres
- c. Women Study Centres.
- d. Statellite Study Centres
- e. Study Centre at Jail.
- f. Study Centre for disabled persons.

Open Universities do not have constituent colleges or regular campuses to provide access to education. It has a unique feature in the form of Regional Services to extend student support services throughout the state. Under the effort to help students in teaching-learning process, the VMOU opens study centres mainly in the academic institutions of higher learning wherever possible and use the premises on holidays and in off hours. Local qualified talent is being involved in imparting education on part time basis with the help of Self-Instructional Material provided to each student by VMOU. This makes the University a cost effective organization. The work of the part-time staff at Study Centres is supervised and monitored by Director, Regional Centre. At present there are six Regional Centres working in the State. The entire process of the student support services is planned, supervised and monitored by Director (Regional Services) at headquarters. ### **INTERACTIVE RADIO COUNSELLING**

One of the major characteristics of the distance education system is the two-way interaction like classroom teaching. This is ensured through phone-in-interactive Radio Counselling on every fourth Sunday of the month from all the centres of Akashwani in Rajasthan. The table below presents a brief history since its beginning in April, 2000 in the University. This programme is also known as phone-in – Radio Counselling and was started on 23<sup>rd</sup> April 2000 from Jaipur station of All India Radio and is relayed by all the Radio Stations in Rajasthan. This is one of most popular programmes of the University. The University authorities finalize the topic for Radio Counselling. It is announced in advance. Then the learners are contacted through reply post card and questions are invited through post. They are also advised to ask questions during the Radio Counselling on phone. For this purpose the Regional Offices are kept open so that they need not spend on Telephone bill. The questions received by post are collected and discussed with faculty members and experts in advance so that they can be answered during the Radio Counselling programme.

## **Material Production and Distribution Unit**

**Material Production and Distribution (MP&D) Unit is catalyst to produce and distribute the printed study material to the registered students of the University. It operates through two functions, (i) Production and (ii) Distribution.**

### **(i) Production Section:-**

Production Section of the Unit procures paper and card sheets through DGS&D rate contract as per annual estimates and emergency requirements along with requirements of other units of the University. Suitable arrangements are made for storage, for effective handling and issuing of the paper/ card-sheets to the printers for printing of study materials as per printing orders. Arrangements are also made for storage of negative and positive films to be used in future. During the year 2005-2006 about 100 MT 24x34 inch, 60 GSM maplitho paper & 209 reams of other types of paper were purchased for worth Rs. 38,29,304/- for printing work. 9 M.T. Card-Sheets for cover of the books were purchased Rs 4,50,851/-. Besides general paper used for books was purchased for miscellaneous printing work of different sizes and uses for publicity material & seminars.

**During the year 2005-2006 , following printing firms were approved and continued for the printing work. These firms were: -**

1. M/S Premier Printing Press, Jaipur,
2. M/S Harihar Printing Press, Jaipur,
3. M/S The Diamond Printing Press, Jaipur
4. M/S The Pooja, Kota.

During the year 2005-2006 total expenditure booked in Head of printing was Rs. 25,64,590/- (Rs. 17,69198/- booked in University's own Resources Head of Printing and Rs.7, 95392/- booked in Head of DEC Grant) besides books it includes Admission Forms, publicity materials, examination related materials, Home Assignments etc.

### **(ii) Distribution Section:-**

Distribution Sections of the Unit is responsible for dispatch of study material to the registered students of the University. During the year 2005 - 2006 Department has sent study material along with assignments of all the programmes to about 16294 registered students. That is an increased no of the students

## **Progress -Report**

Progress Report during the year 2005-2006 is detailed out as under:-

### **(1) Centralized Storage of Study Materials:-**

After shifting all study material lying at R.C. Jaipur to Kota MP&D Store. Scrutiny of waste books is being done & old books are being used & re-arranged systematically in sets of paper.

**(2) Increased Quantity of Purchase of Paper / Card Sheets:-**

Enhancement in courses & no of students resulted in additional purchase of 60.75 MT Paper and 0.51 M.T.card sheets respectively compared to last year 2004-05. Thus cost of paper and card sheet also increased.

**(3) Value of Printing Work:-**

The MP&D unit undertakes the printing work of study material along with other printing work of other units of the University. Total booklets of the study material printed during 2005-06 were 6,95,575 in numbers in addition to miscellaneous printing work of other units which is higher than previous year

**(4) Memorandum of Understanding for Sale/Use of Study Material of VMOU:-**

Arrangements have been made for sale of study material developed by VMOU. At present the study material of 17 programmes is ready for sale as per catalogue & work of updating the price catalogue is in progress with other newly developed programmes i.e PGDESD & CLAW. Total revenue received by sale of study material (MJMC, BLS, CRLC) is Rs. 8,70,565/- from other universities & students. MOU for reproduction right and use by UPRTOU Allahabad for MHI and MEC was finalised on 29-12-2005. MOU for reproduction and use for the course material of MJ(MC) by Nalanda Open University Patna is on process.

**(5) MOUs for reproduction right & use of study material of IGNOU**

Under the scheme of mutual co-operation and collaboration with IGNOU the study material of IGNOU is used by the university under MOU. During the year the MOUs signed between IGNOU and VMOU for various Academic Programmes are as under: -

- (i) Certificate in Disaster Management (CDM).

**(8) Statutory Meetings of Printing Advisory Committee :-**

Two meetings of Printing Advisory Committee were held as per decision 24-4-05 & 12-11-05. That were 19<sup>th</sup> & 20<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Committee Department also arranged so many other meetings of Paper Purchase Committee & Printing Committee etc.

## **PERSPECTIVE PLAN 2006-07**

Education creates choices and opportunities for people, reduces the twin burdens of poverty and diseases, and gives a stronger voice in society. The V. M. Open University is functioning since 1987 in the State of Rajasthan. It was established with a view to monitoring and coordinating the distance education system in the state. It had been given responsibility to take education to the doorsteps of those who could not avail of the conventional educational facilities due various reasons.

To achieve the aims and objectives, as decided by VMOU, the following perspective plan is proposed –

### **1. New Professional and Innovative educational programmes**

Instead of offering traditional courses, professional and innovative JOB and CAREER oriented courses are need of the hour. The University intends to launch Bachelor degree in Automobile Engineering, Master's in Education, M.Com., certificate course in Information Technology, Other programmes which may be offered by the University are Arid Land Management, Bio-Tech, Public Accounting, Animal Husbandry and Dairy Farming, Company Law and Secretarial Practice, Fine Arts, Human Nutrition and Health Management, Refrigeration etc. Such innovative programmes will definitely contribute to the all round growth of the State. ## **2. Software Developments and Maintenance**

The Computer Division will also be involved with software application development for various divisions like Material Production and Distribution, Finance and Accounts. It will also develop software for streamlining and facilitating student related activities like Admission, Registration, Evaluation and MIS for the Regional Centres and the Regional Services at the Headquarters.

## **3. Increase in learner base**

Though there is a great potential for an open university to increase its learner base in the state of Rajasthan. The conventional universities in the state are still running with the practices of private appearance. As per the latest estimates, the total number of non-collegiate students in the state is over 2,40,000. VMOU will target to cater to this learner base under open and distance learning system.

## **4. Student Support Services Network Expansion**

The University will expand and strengthen the network of Academic Support Services for the learners in the State. More Study Centres, Rural Study Centres and Specialised Study Centres especially for women and tribals will be established by the University in order to effectively serve people in the coming years. The concept of Mobile Library also may gain practical shape, which will enhance distance learning in rural and remote areas including backward communities. Short Term Training Programmes for Support Services and Continuing Education at different Regional Centres will form part of routine activities of the University in order to develop its own human resources.

**5. Opening admission to foreign students**- The University till now was not granting admission to the foreign national for its various programmes Last year we received a request from some of the Kenyan students who were willing to pursue their studies in various Diploma Programmes of the University. The University appointed a Committee of the School Directors and on the recommendation decided to open the admission to foreign nationals at all its Regional Centre Headquarters from the year 2005 – 06.
